# ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION

## JUNIOR EDUCATORS PROGRAM

The longest running of Bahay Tuluyan's Alternative Education programs, the Junior Educators Program ran from January until June 2010, to complete training the 11th batch of Junior Educators from Bahay Tuluyan.

### Background

The JE program was run under the final six months of a 3 year project with Cordaid, Netherlands entitled 'Using Child to Child Education to Fight Child Abuse' that aims to:

1. Equip children in need of special protection with the knowledge, skills, and forums to participate actively in society.
2. Improve protection for street children, by improving services and government responsiveness.
3. Decrease the rates of abuse and exploitation of children in the target areas.

During 2010 the program was managed by Jeniliza Sano and coordinated by Reyna dela Cruz. Liza Orias, RN and Anna Liza Samarita-Aliwalas, RN.



### Participants

There were approximately 54 participants from two batches of Junior Educators involved in the program during 2020. Batch 10 involved a total of 22 participants. Batch 11 involved a total of 32 participants. These participants were children and youth in need of special protection from the areas of:

## JUNIOR HEALTH WORKERS PROGRAM

In 2010 the 8<sup>th</sup> batch of Junior Health Workers from Bahay Tuluyan completed their training.

### Background

From January until June 2010 the Junior Health Workers Program was sponsored by:

- Misereor (Germany) under a three year project entitled 'Junior Health Workers Program'; and
- Philippine Australia Community Assistance Program (PACAP) under a project entitled 'Grassroots Health – Junior Health Workers Program'

The partnership with Misereor ended in June 2010 due to a shift in strategic direction by Misereor. Bahay Tuluyan's partnership with

PACAP ended in August 2010, with the possibility of being restarted again in the future, due to a structural review of PACAP.

### Participants

## SOCIAL SERVICES

### DROP IN CENTER - MANILA

During 2010 preparations were being made to construct Bahay Tuluyan's new Drop-In Center under the 'A Home of Our Own' project. Upon completion of those facilities (in 2011) the drop in center program will be fully operational.

### CRISIS CENTER - MANILA

Construction of a new crisis center was commenced as part of the 'A Home of Our Own' project in 2010. It is expected that this center will be fully operational towards the end of 2011. The Crisis Center did not operate during 2010.

### RESIDENTIAL SHELTER – VICTORIA

Two new buildings were added to the Residential Shelter in Victoria during 2010. Both of these buildings were constructed through the support of the Rotary Club of Essendon and Kangan Institute, Australia.

The first, McKiro House, was blessed and opened on 1 May 2010. McKiro House has accommodation for 12 children and was used as a family home for children.

Anihan Center was blessed and opened on 18 December 2010. This building comprised of a central kitchen, open recreation area, social workers office, counselling room, play therapy room, computer room, sick bay and two rooms for emergency accommodation.



### Children Served

During 2010 a total of 37 children were sheltered in Bahay Tuluyan's residential shelter in Victoria. On average there were 28 children in the shelter. The children sheltered were predominantly female but there were also some younger male children who had female siblings also in the center or were too young to be transferred to San Antonio. The children ranged in age from 6 – 19 years of age.

### Education

At the end of the 2009 – 10 school year, there were 31 children enrolled in formal schooling including:

- 19 children at Masapang Elementary School
- 1 child at Pag-ibig at Pag-Asa School, San Pablo (SPED)
- 10 children at Masapang National High School
- 1 at Pedro Guevarra National High School, Sta Cruz (SPED)

Four children graduated from Masapang Elementary School in March 2010 and two from Masapang National High School, with several children receiving awards.

At the beginning of the 2010 – 11 school year, there were 26 children enrolled in formal schooling including 1 at tertiary level:

- 13 children at Masapang Elementary School

- 2 children at Pag-ibig at Pag-Asa School, San Pablo (SPED)
- 10 children at Masapang National High School
- 1 child at P Guevarra National High School, Sta Cruz (SPED)
- 1 child at Laguna State Polytechnic University in BS –IT course

All children in schooling were provided with support for their studies, through tutorials, school visits and the provision of materials and other needs.



Throughout the year the children participated in a wide range of extra-curricular activities including Science Club, MTAP, Boy Scouts, Red Cross and sporting activities.

### Case Management

During 2010 case management services were provided to all the children living in the residential shelter. These were coordinated by Quennie Bala, RSW, under the supervision of Anna Liza Samarita – Aliwalas, RSW. The case management services provided included:

- Admissions
- Preparation of Social Case Study Reports
- Preparation, implementation and updating of Treatment Plans
- Case Conferences
- Counseling & psycho-social intervention
- Family intervention and mediation

- Coordination of the provision of legal & medical services
- Home and school visits
- Accessing professional services / providing referrals

Sunflower Children's Home assisted in the provision of case management this year through the provision of psychological services.

## RESIDENTIAL SHELTER – SAN ANTONIO

### Children Served

A total of 37 children were sheltered in Bahay Tuluyan's residential shelter in San Antonio

during 2010. On average there were 28 children in the shelter. All of the children sheltered were male and ranged in age from 4 to 21 years old.



### Education

At the end of the 2009 – 10 school year, in March 2010, there were 29 children enrolled in formal schooling including:

- 13 children at Niing Elementary School
- 14 children at San Antonio National High School
- 2 children at Dualtech in an Electro Mechanics course

Two children graduated from San Antonio National High School in March 2010.

At the beginning of the 2010 – 11 school year, in June 2010, 30 children were enrolled in formal schooling including 4 at tertiary level:

- 13 children at Niing Elementary School
- 1 child at Pag-Ibig at Pag-Asa School, San Pablo (SPED)
- 12 children at San Antonio National High School
- 2 children at Dualtech in an Electro Mechanics course
- 1 child at Dalubhaasan ng Lungsod ng San Pablo in BS Psychology course
- 1 child at St Therese School in Culinary Course

All children in schooling were provided with support for their studies, through tutorials,

school visits and the provision of materials and other needs.

Throughout the year the children participated in a wide range of extra-curricular activities including field trips, MTAP, poster making, news casting, athletics, Boy Scout camp, tennis, high jump, badminto and volleyball.

The children received many awards for their efforts and several were chosen to represent their school in inter-school events.

### **Case Management**

During 2010 case management services were provided to all the children living in the residential shelter. These were coordinated by Lecyl Suson, RSW and Jeniliza Endonila, RSW, under the supervision of Anna Liza Samarita – Aliwalas, RSW. They were assisted by Alvin Maceda, RSW for some time. The case management services provided included:

- Admissions
- Preparation of Social Case Study Reports
- Preparation, implementation and updating of Treatment Plans
- Case Conferences
- Counseling & psycho-social intervention
- Family intervention and mediation
- Coordination of the provision of legal & medical services
- Home and school visits

Sunflower Children’s Home assisted in the provision of case management this year through the provision of psychological services.

One child resident of the shelter was elected to a position on the Sangguniang Kabataan in elections held in October 2010.

### **INDEPENDENT LIVING SKILLS PROGRAM**

During 2010 the Independent Living Skills Program was in planning and development phase. Bahay Tuluyan was working on the ‘Setting up the Future’ project which aims to fully establish and implement the Independent Living Skills Program over three years, until December 2011.

This project is being worked on cooperatively with the Australian Youth Ambassadors for Development (AYAD) and Volunteers for

International Development Australia (VIDA). Daniel Noriega, a VIDA volunteer, was placed with Bahay Tuluyan in September 2010 to coordinate this program.

### **Personality Development and Relationships & Reproductive Health**

Under Bahay Tuluyan's partnership with AYAD, Kate McGannon was placed with Bahay Tuluyan in November 2009. Her assignment as Reproductive Health Officer was to develop the Personality Development and Relationships and Reproductive Health Program Components of the ILSP.

During 2010 the modules for Personality Development and Reproductive Health were designed and pilot tested. A total of 30 children from Bahay Tuluyan's residential shelters in Laguna and Quezon participated in the pilots.

The modules were produced in manual form and trainers' training was provided to all social workers and various other social services staff.

### **Career Preparedness**

During 2010 work was done to conceptualise and plan the Career Preparedness module with pilots scheduled to be held in summer (April-May) 2011.

### **Home Life Skills**

The Home Life Skills program was implemented informally during 2010, with social services staff providing guidance and tutelage to young people in developing home life skills such as cooking, cleaning, shopping and managing a budget.

A more comprehensive Nutrition & Wellbeing module was being designed in 2010 for piloting in 2011.

### **Entrepreneurial Training**

The following activities took place in relation to entrepreneurial training for young people in 2010:

- **Child @ Venture Café** – The Café finally received a permit to operate in June 2010 and was officially opened to the public on 8 June 2010. Twelve young people were involved in running the café during 2010. They worked regular shifts to complete their on the job training.



- **Entrepreneurial Training** – Provided by Child at Venture for 15 young people working in Child @ Venture Café; Self Empowerment and Team Building on 10 July 2010 and Budgeting Income and Expenses on 11 July 2010
- **Magazine Jewellery making** – a total of 14 young people were involved in designing and making jewellery for Bahay Tuluyan's magazine jewelry project. Efforts were commenced to start online sales of these products.

### **Group Home Living**

During 2010 two group homes were operative for children living in Bahay Tuluyan's residential shelter in San Antonio and one in Bahay Tuluyan's residential shelter in Victoria.

These operated to capacity throughout the year.

# IKOT TAMBAYAN STAR CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

During 2010 the Ikot Tambayan STAR Children's Program was sponsored by Tolvskillingshjälpen through Bahay Tuluyan Sweden.

## BACKGROUND

### Geographical Coverage

Throughout 2010, the Ikot STAR provided services to children in the following areas of Manila:

- Osmena Highway – an area near the highway. Most of the beneficiaries in this area used to live under the bridge but their houses were demolished in 2007. They were relocated to Laguna but many children have returned to the area to work, selling flowers and rags etc.
- Pandacan – a small street community under a bridge where children live with their families in makeshift houses. The houses are frequently demolished but no relocation site is provided so the families keep returning to the area.



- Sampaloc- 9 Near Quiapo and Morayta. Children and their families are living in an old and unused building. They rent a room inside the building but most of the time they stay on the street outside the building. Ikot STAR participants in this area are often seen outside the university begging from the students.
- Paraiso ng Batang Maynila - a playground near two urban poor communities – Dakota and Leveriza. Many children come from the community but some live with their families in wooden carts around the playground area.

### Participants

A total of 3780 participants were involved in the Ikot STAR activities that were conducted in 2010. An average of 365 children were involved in activities each term, with the peak being 495 children in Term 5.

## ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION

### **Term Structure**

Alternative Education was delivered to the children involved in the Ikot STAR through regular sessions. The year was broken down into six terms which ran for approximately two months each. Each term was composed of an average of seven weeks 'Street Based Activities' and two weeks 'Case Management, Evaluation and Planning'.

Each term focused on a different topic related to children's rights and the children participated in a progressive series of sessions related to this topic. The topics were:

- Term 1 – Fundamental Principles
- Term 2 – Health, Nutrition & Welfare
- Term 3 – Family & Alternative Care
- Term 4 – Education, Culture & Leisure
- Term 5 – Special Protection Measures
- Term 6 – Civil & Political Rights

### **Sessions**

A total of 128 sessions were provided during the year, with an average of 23 sessions provided each term. There were an average of 35 participants in each session. The number of children in each session ranged from 13 to 75, with a total of 3780 participants in sessions throughout the year. Youth facilitators, young people who had graduated from one of Bahay Tuluyan's Alternative Education programs, facilitated the workshop sessions.



In addition, 39 children from the Ikot STAR program became involved in other, more intensive Alternative Education programs with Bahay Tuluyan.

## CASE MANAGEMENT

The social worker provided some case management through the Ikot STAR program, to the extent possible given the time and resources available. During 2010 a total of 28 comprehensive intake interviews were conducted.



Counseling was provided regularly on a needs basis for children involved in Ikot STAR activities. Considerable case management work was involved in processing the admissions, including conducting interviews, preparing social case studies, facilitating medical examinations, processing legal papers, attending hearings, conducting counselling, conducting home and school visits and coordinating with relevant regulatory authorities.

Some support was provided for case management through the SENMAP psychologist, Ma. Elisa Bermio. In particular this involved the provision of training to members of the Ikot STAR team including Psychosocial training and 'Care for the Caregiver' training

## MEDICAL AND LEGAL ASSISTANCE

First aid and wound dressing took place on a regular basis on the street. Medical services

were accessed at Ospital ng Maynila, Manila Doctors Hospital and Philippine General Hospital when necessary.

Specialist medical attention, including medico-legal examinations and maxillo-oral surgery were facilitated for various children who had been victims of abuse or suffered particular illnesses.

Throughout 2010 various children were assisted with legal needs, particularly through assisting them to make reports to the police in relation to cases of child abuse. One child was given assistance, in cooperation with the Child Justice League to file cases against two perpetrators with the City Prosecutor in the City of Manila.

## **NUTRITIONAL ASSISTANCE**

All children who attended alternative education sessions on the street were provided with snacks after completing the activity. This worked as a powerful motivator for the children to cease their income generating activities to attend the sessions. It also assisted to meet some of their nutritional needs.

Through the support of PACAP Bahay Tuluyan was able to establish four Community Learning Corners in the areas where the Mobile Unit works. These CLCs contain books, educational materials and computers.



# RESEARCH TRAINING & ADVOCACY

## PINAG ISANG LAKAS NG KABATAAN (PILAK)

### Background

PILAK was established in November 2006 as a youth advocacy group. The founding members were graduates of Bahay Tuluyan's Alternative Education programs who wanted to advocate for children's rights.

In 2010 PILAK included more than 63 young leaders from Manila, Laguna and Quezon and was run on a local basis.

### Training & Workshops

Philippine Educational Theater Association (PETA) assisted 21 members of PILAK (7 for each area) with capacity building and creative workshops during 2010 as follows:

- Creative Writing Workshop, 28 – 29 March 2010
- Repertory Theater Guidance, 13 – 14 April 2010
- Story Development & Creative Writing / Production Workshop – 28 – 30 March 2010
- Directing Workshop – 18 – 22 May 2010
- Rehearsals – 1 – 11 April 2010

At the end of these workshops each PILAK group had mounted their own performance which they toured in their own communities.

### PILAK Manila Theater Tour

Seven members of PILAK Manila mounted two short performances titled '*Lapis*' and '*OFW*'. *Lapis* was the story of a child who was too lazy to study so he kept breaking his pencil. One day his pencil took revenge by turning the child into a pencil himself until he promised to study.

*OFW* as about the child of an OFW who rebelled against his parents. He turned to drugs and ended up in jail. He eventually overcame his anger when he learnt why his mother had to work overseas.

*Lapis* and *OFW* performed two shows each in April 2010 for a total of 175 people:

- Bahay Tuluyan Malate, 18 April 2010 - 135 participants
- Morayta community Manila, 24 April 2010 – 40 participants



### PILAK Laguna Theater Tour

Seven members of PILAK Laguna mounted two performances entitled '*Basket*' and '*Kaibigan*'.

*Basket* was the story of a child who had a disability and was teased and discriminated against. Through the play PILAK showed that sometimes people with disability can perform even better than those without due to sheer determination and hard work.

*Kaibigan* was the story of a child who had lost his parents but was still able to feel the love and care of other people and his family.

*Basket* and *Kaibigan* performed five shows each for a total of 590 people:

- Brgy San Francisco Victoria, 24 April 2010 - 60 participants
- Brgy San Felix Victoria, 24 April 2010 – 140 participants

- Brgy San Benito Victoria, 26 April 2010 - 140 participants
- Brgy Hangan Victoria, 26 April 2010 - 180 participants
- Brgy San Roque Victoria 26 April 2010 – 70 participants

### **PILAK Quezon Theater Tour**

The seven representatives of PILAK Quezon mounted two performances entitled *Gulay* and *Kaibigan*.

*Gulay* was the story of a child who didn't like eating vegetables. He overcame his inability to eat vegetables after dreaming of what might happen to him.

*Kaibigan* was the story of the importance of having a good friend.

*Gulay* and *Kaibigan* performed two shows each for 632 people in Quezon:

- Bahay Tuluyan San Antonio, 18 April 2011 - 32 participants
- Brgy Niing San Antonio, 26 April 2010 – 600 participants

### **PILAK Theater tour – Journey**

Two representatives of PILAK – Donato Seneres and Angel Cepres, toured their performance 'Journey' during 2010. This performance was originally mounted to be shown during KidsView 2010. It performed the following shows:

- Kids Create Change event, QC, 3 February 2010 – 140 participants
- Victoria Children's Congress, Victoria, 30 January 2010 – 60 participants
- San Antonio Children's Congress, 6 February 2010 – 140 participants
- US Peace Corps Volunteer Induction, 22 August 2010 – 200 participants – Additional performers from PILAK participated in this performance

### **Other Activities**

- **Children's Rights Festival** – 20 November 2010 – PILAK assisted in running this event
- **Performances at Community Days** – the PILAK groups in each of Manila, Victoria and San Antonio created short performances to perform at community days and other events during the year

## **KIDSVIEW 2010**

KidsView 2010 was an event organized by Bahay Tuluyan Philippines Australia (**BTPA**). The objective of the tour was to raise awareness amongst Australian people about poverty and the issues facing children in the Philippines. The tour involved a variety of activities in the states of Victoria, Tasmania and New South Wales.

Representatives from Bahay Tuluyan went to Australia for the tour. They were:

- Catherine Scerri, Development Manager and AVI volunteer
- Jeniliza Sano, Admin Officer & Social Worker
- Donato Seneres, youth advocate
- Angel Cepres, youth advocate

Over the period of the tour, which commenced on 9 April 2010 and ended on 31 May 2010, 51 events were held for more than 4300 people in 3 states.



The events which were part of the project included:

- 12 interschool forums
- 13 school presentations
- 9 presentations for adult groups
- 5 fundraising events
- 9 media events
- 6 meetings

The youth advocates from Bahay Tuluyan, Donato Seneres and Angel Cepres, prepared a performance entitled 'Change Begins with Me' with the assistance of the Philippine Educational Theater Association. This performance used dance, drama, music and pictures to tell the stories of the two young people and of children living on the street in Manila. This performance was delivered at all of the events throughout the project.

## CHILDREN'S RIGHTS FESTIVAL 2010

The Children's Rights Festival was held at Quirino Grandstand, Luneta Park, Manila on 20 November 2010 with the theme 'Makabatang Mundo' (A Child Friendly World).

This festival built on the two Street Children's Festivals organised by Bahay Tuluyan in 2008 and 2009.



The event featured 52 activity booths which contained a wide variety of games, discussions, performances and interactive activities for children. These booths were set up in 5

different 'worlds', relating to 5 different categories of children's rights:

- 'Pakikilahok at Kalayaan' – Civil and Political Freedom
- 'Pagkalinga sa Pamilya' – Family and Alternative Care
- 'Talino, Talento at Laro' – Education, Culture and Leisure
- 'Tirahan, Pagkain at Kalusugan' – Health, Nutrition and Welfare
- 'Ligtas sa Panganib' – Special Protection

A total of 2035 children and their carers/guardians participated in the festival. A total of 129 youth leaders were involved in helping run the festival.

There were a total of 71 organizations that contributed to the festival in some way. The festival was sponsored by CIFA Onlus and UNICEF and hosted by Bahay Tuluyan.



A total of 708 volunteers assisted on the day of the festival. A large number of guests were invited to attend the festival, particularly key people in government agencies involved with children. Those special guests who attended include:

## MUNTING TINIG, KARAPATAN NAIS MARINIG

In the lead up to the Children’s Rights Festival and in anticipation of the celebration of the 21<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the ratification of the UNCRC, Bahay Tuluyan led a competition during which children from all over the Philippines were invited to reflect on ‘what do children’s rights mean to me?’. Children were invited to use creative media (poetry, song, short stories, painting or drawings) to respond to the questions

- What do children’s rights mean in my life?
- How have children’s rights helped me?
- What do I think we still need to do to improve the lives of Filipino children?

Children were invited to participate directly and through schools, government agencies and NGOs. A total of 153 entries were received. The best twenty nine (29) entries were selected by a jury of children. The winning entries were laid out and printed into a book called ‘Munting Tinig, Karapatan Nais Marining’.



During the Children’s Rights Festival a group of child representatives presented this book to Secretary Dinky Soliman, as representative of President Benigno S. Aquino. Copies of the book were also presented to special guests representing:

## ‘SAGIP OR HULI’ ADVOCACY

Since 2007 Bahay Tuluyan has been conducting advocacy around the issue of ‘rescue’ of street children. It’s research study entitled ‘Sagip or Huli?: Rescue of Street Children in Caloocan, Manila Pasay and Quezon Cities’ was launched in 2009.



During 2010 Bahay Tuluyan continued to advocate for a review of the practice of rescue. As part of this advocacy it was involved in the following:

### RICE PRODUCTION

In 2010 Bahay Tuluyan started to grow rice on a rented rice field located in Bangyas, Calauan, Laguna. It was able to produce two harvests comprising of:

- 24 March 2010 – 59.5 sacks of rice
- 12 November 2010 – 51.5 sacks of rice



## CHILD @ VENTURE CAFE

On 8 June 2010 the Child @ Venture Café was formally opened to the public. The Café operated 6 days a week from 8 June 2010.

Twelve young people from Bahay Tuluyan were involved in working in the café.

## JUNK TO FUNK – MAGAZINE JEWELLERY PRODUCTION

Bahay Tuluyan's 'Junk to Funk' project to create jewellery from old magazines continued during

2010. A large number of new product designs were developed. Children and families from Victoria and Manila were involved in making jewellery which was sold both locally and internationally.

During 2010 the management of this project was done by the Child @ Venture Café.

### A HOME OF OUR OWN

Bahay Tuluyan's campaign to have a home of its own began in April 2008 and continued throughout 2010.

During 2010 fundraising continued to secure the money to build the building on the land which was purchased in 2009. A considerable amount of fundraising was done in Australia and this was boosted by contributions from Rotary Club of Essendon & Kangan Institute, ANZ, AusPhil Tollways Corporation, DAP – Australian Embassy and a large contribution from the Planet Wheeler Foundation.

Plans were being finalized and in September pile driving of the foundations was commenced. It is expected that the building will be completed by November 2011.



### REALISING THE DREAM

Bahay Tuluyan's campaign to develop a haven for children to live, a community resource and a model of sustainability in Victoria, Laguna made more progress in 2010. In particular:

1. **Construction of McKiro House** – A new home for children, McKiro House was completed and opened on 1 May 2010. This house was sponsored by Rotary Club of Essendon and Kangan Institution. It was named for these two organization and for Carmel McCarthy, a strong Bahay Tuluyan supporter from Kangan Institute.



2. **Construction of Anihan Center** – this center was completed and opened on 18 December 2010. It was sponsored by Rotary Club of Essendon and Kangan Institute. It contains a central kitchen, open recreation area, social workers office, counseling room, play therapy room, computer room, sick bay and emergency accommodation.
